## REVIEWS OF ANIMAL SCIENCE FIELD DAY

The Fourth Annual Southern Area Animal Science Field Day was held on Saturday, September 23<sup>rd</sup>, at Mt. San Antonio College in Walnut, CA. It was a fun, informative, and well-attended day. The Animal Science Field Day is where kids from different 4-H clubs in southern California come together to learn about animals.

There were presentations on many different topics like “Raising your Score in Rabbit Showmanship” presented by Devon Bean and “Measuring Your Pygmy and Dairy Goat for Production and Longevity” Presented by Donna Elkins. Devon Bean and her brother gave back-to-back presentations giving members information about showmanship with Rabbits and Caveys. Members even got to practice with their potato Cavey! Showmanship is very important to 4-Hers with animals. The presentation by Donna Elkins was very interesting also. It was about how to choose your pygmy and dairy goat. She taught members what features in the animal to look for when in the market of breeding pigmy and dairy goats.

After all the presentations were finished we had a short lunch break were there was pizza and other foods to purchase. Some kids sat out on the grass and enjoyed a picnic. The last two things we did were a silent auction and opportunity drawing. In the silent auction, there were many different things that members and families could bid on and win. Items for bid included animal grooming supplies, a cat bed, animal food, and a Trader Joe’s bag of groceries. Thank you to the donors of these items. Finally, there was an opportunity drawing where kids could pick out prizes to take home. Prizes for kids included pet food and supplies, buckets, fidget spinners, and pet supplies like leashes and bowls. Overall the Southern Area Animal Science Field Day was a great success!

One focus of the small animal field day was called “Ms. Cluck Has Something On Her Butt” and it was about the pests found on poultry. Dr. Amy Murillo who is a professor at UC Riverside talked about little pests called fleas, lice, and ticks that infest poultry. Dr. Murillo told the audience to not use cat or dog flea treatment (called Frontline) on your chickens because they are naturally oily and the oil-based medicine is bad for them. If you use Frontline the eggs can never be eaten again and the chicken cannot be eaten either.

Another presenter was Linda Randall and she presented “Meet a Canine Good Citizen and Teach your Dog to be one too”. Linda brought her Scottish wolfhound to show how you can train a dog, even a very big dog like hers, to be well-behaved and a good citizen. She had the dog be near a crowd, walk around cones, and meet new people. She said it is important for dogs to be good around other dogs that they don’t bark and fight. Scottish wolfhounds can grow to be over 100 pounds.
